Brian is president of the Montreal Highland Games and a past president of the St. Andrew's Society, and has also been instrumental in the work of the Black Watch Scottish Arts Society and other piping and drumming societies in the province and beyond. He is well known for his tireless efforts to promote Scottish arts and culture throughout Quebec, efforts which have contributed greatly to a revival of interest in Celtic history in the region. Other Thistle Award winners this year include Campbell Oliver, Cecil McPhee, Julie Perron and Peter Matulina, who are all members or close friends of the Society. Congratulations to all!

On the evening of June 18, eager Society members negotiated orange cones and fought gridlock traffic to attend the Society's **Annual Barbecue** and get their dose of Scottish summer music and sausages in historic Griffintown. Thirty-odd members were in attendance on a warm clear evening to sample the offerings of the 4 Origines Microbrewery—three different types of barbecued sausages, a delicious three-bean salad with feta cheese, and fresh red cabbage coleslaw. With a wide choice of

delicious artisanal beers on offer, many varieties were sampled and enjoyed. Passers-by stopped, listened and watched as Black Watch Association pipers and drummers played for dancers from the Jennifer Stevenson School of Highland Dance who gave a spirited display of fiery Highland dancing. A special thank-you to brewery owner and Society life member Michael d'Ornellas for hosting this successful event.

# RIDING THE MARCHES IN GALASHIELS

This year I decided to time my annual visit to my home town of Galashiels to coincide with the Braw Lads Gathering, a local tradition started in 1930 to commemorate historical events which took place in our town.

Each of the Border towns has a "common riding"—an equestrian tradition dating back to the Middle Ages in which riders ride out from the town and along its borders in order to check that the boundaries of the common land have not been moved.

The oldest common riding is held in Hawick, and celebrates the bringing home of a flag taken from an English raiding party at the Battle of Hornshole in 1514.

The other towns that celebrate the riding of the marches are Langholm, Selkirk and Lauder.

It is an opportunity for the residents to have a good time and is usually accompanied by sports and much drinking.

#### BURNS COTTAGE IN NEED OF REPAIRS

The National Trust of Scotland reports that the Burns Cottage, the birthplace in Ayrshire of beloved poet Robert Burns, is in urgent need of repairs. The thatch is beginning to rot and wear away, there are cracks in the walls and windows, and a

gable is coming away from the rest of the cottage which is allowing wind and rain to damage the interior plasterwork.

In order to save this historic site, the Trust is seeking to raise £100,000 which will allow them to rethatch the roof, repair the cracks and weatherproof the structure.



#### MICHAEL HARRIS GRANTED HONORARY DOCTORATE

The Society is delighted to congratulate member Michael Harris who has recently been named Doctor of Letters, *honoris causa* by McGill University.

A native Glaswegian, Michael has had a long and celebrated career in Montreal as a poet, translator, editor, educator and rare book expert. He is a two-time winner of the CBC Literary Competition—Poetry, including First Prize for Poetry in 1988 with his collection *Spring Descending*. Other publications have been nominated for the Governor General's Award and shortlisted for the Quebec Writers Federation's A. M. Klein Prize for Poetry. In addition to his original work, he is also renowned as a translator and editor of poetry, bringing these works to wider audiences and helping to raise the profile of the Canadian literary scene. His translations have also received numerous prizes and award nominations.

Apart from his literary activities, Michael has been elected President of the Black Watch (RHR) Cadet Support Committee; his son Gabriel, an accomplished piper, was recently appointed Cadet Regimental Sergeant-Major of the Black Watch Cadet Corps and also plays pipes with the Black Watch Association Pipe Band. Gabriel has served as an escort at our annual Ball.

Michael operates Montreal Books, an online bookshop dedicated to rare and used volumes.



# LEE McLEAN WATSON (1902–1972): MAYOR OF LENNOXVILLE

Astreet in Sherbrooke's Lennoxville Borough is named for an illustrious third-generation Scottish descendant, Lee McLean Watson. The street had been planned by Lennoxville Town Council since 1975 and was opened in 1991 on Lieutenant-Colonel Watson's former farm.

Lee Watson was born in Sydney, Nova Scotia in March 1902. He was the sixth of the eight boys of Isabella Howliston Greener (1866–1912) and of Robert Alexander Lee Watson (1866–1942), an Ontario-born telegrapher. Isabella's parents, Elizabeth Howliston and John Greener, had been married in 1866 at Newcastle, England. Robert's parents, Cecily Ann Lee and David N. Watson, had been married in 1865 in Sydney, Nova Scotia, and his grandparents had been married in 1814 at Dunfermline, Scotland.

When he was 10 years old, Lee Watson was a Canadian army cadet in Cape Breton, Nova Scotia. He settled in Lennoxville in 1916 and went to work for another Scottish descendant, James Simpson Mitchell, in his hardware store on Wellington Street North in Sherbrooke. In 1918, Lee Watson joined the 53rd Sherbrooke Regiment which would become The Sherbrooke Regiment in 1920. Lee Watson was rapidly promoted: Lieutenant in 1922, Captain in 1924 and Major in 1929. In 1926, he started his own business as an insurance broker, under the corporate name of Lee M. Watson & Co. Ltd. He

continued his career until he retired around 1967. In 1960, he had become partners with William J. Fuller, forming the Watson & Fuller firm.

In 1930, Lee Watson married Lillian Gertrude Bayne (1899–1995), from Barnston, in St. George's Church, Lennoxville. He was a Lennoxville Town Councilor, at least in 1939–1940. In 1938, he replaced Lieutenant-Colonel W. E. Baker as Commandant of the Sherbrooke Regiment, with the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel. In 1940, he was replaced in turn by Lieutenant-Colonel T. R. MacKenzie. He was awarded the Canadian Efficiency Decoration (ED) for his loyal services. Lee Watson was Mayor of Lennoxville from 1951 to 1956.

Socially, Lee Watson was President of the Rotary Club in 1935–1936, President in 1938–1939 of the Men's division of the Lennoxville Curling Club, a member of the Sherbrooke Hospital Board, a member from 1950 to 1970 of Bishop's University Board of Governors, a member of Compton's King's Hall Board and a churchwarden of Lennoxville's St. George's Anglican Church. He was also awarded in 1968 the Centennial Medal of Canada in recognition of his contribution to the events marking the festivities in 1967. He died in Sherbrooke Hospital (Argyll Pavilion since 1995) on July 11, 1972. He is buried with his wife in Malvern Cemetery of the Borough of Lennoxville.

# HISTORICAL TARTANS AT THE McCORD MUSEUM

The McCord Museum is grateful to the St. Andrew's Society for its donation of \$750 made in March 2019. This funding has allowed us to take advantage of opportunities to purchase Canadian tartan items for our *Dress, Fashion, and Textiles* collection.

In 2016 as I researched the exhibition *Fashioning Expo 67*, I became aware of the flurry of tartan design in Canada through the 1950s and early 1960s. Tartans were created to symbolize provinces, regions and the entire country, as well as to commemorate the Centennial and even the Fathers of Confederation! As I built up my knowledge of Canadian tartans from this time period, I realized there were unique opportunities to acquire early extant examples. Used goods websites such as Ebay and Etsy occasionally feature items with manufacturer labels that show that they were produced by the original tartan designer or one of the very early licensees. We are now selectively acquiring some of them for the collection thanks to the Society's donation.

Perhaps most well known of all the mid-century Canadian tartans is the Maple Leaf tartan, designed by David Weiser of Highland Queen Sportswear in 1964 in anticipation of the Centennial. To round out our collection of Maple Leaf tartan garments acquired in relation to the exhibition, we purchased a clutch purse complete with its original paper tags that explain the tartan's symbolism.

The Centennial tartan, predominantly blue and green, was designed in 1957 for British Columbia's centennial but was never officially adopted for that event, and instead was promoted as a tartan to commemorate Canada's Centennial. We were able to purchase a man's cotton windbreaker and a wool scarf to add to the women's coordinates and man's shirt in our holdings.

I was very fortunate to find an excellent mid-1950s woman's blazer in Nova Scotia tartan with a Nat Gordon label. This

Montreal manufacturer was amongst the first licensees of this tartan, created in 1953. In 1955 he featured it in a fashion show of women's coordinates presented in New York. While we remain on the lookout for a Nat Gordon pleated skirt in the same fabric that will complete the ensemble, we were fortunate to find one in New Brunswick tartan from the same period that we acquired.

Finally, from two separate vendors we were able to find a girl's cape and kilted skirt in the Olympicana tartan of 1976 of identical size that could be exhibited as an ensemble. David Weiser also designed the Olympicana tartan, a variation on his 1965 Plaid du Québec with the Olympic logo woven into the red squares.

These items contribute to the McCord Museum collection's mission of documenting stories of fashion that are unique to Montreal, Quebec, and Canada. Only two thirds of the funds have been spent; I continue to watch for other outstanding items that will continue to document obscure mid-century Canadian tartans.

#### STUDIES ABROAD IN AULD REEKIE

This fall, with support from the Saint Andrew's Society, I had the supreme privilege of completing my McGill law degree on exchange at The University of Edinburgh. This marked not only my first experience living abroad, but also my first time visiting the homeland from where great-grandparents emigrated over a century ago. The exchange proved to be nothing short of the crown jewel of my law school experience.

#### Hallowed Halls...

Attending the University of Edinburgh was an unforgettable experience. I was both humbled and inspired to study in the same halls as intellectuals titans such as Darwin, Hume, and Maxwell. I often found myself wandering through various campus buildings; reading plaques and monuments which testified to the school's storied heritage.

Seeking to take advantage of my setting, I enrolled in classes which gave me a unique perspective on the Scottish legal system. My favorite course was Books, Law and Lawyers in Scotland: From Humanism through Enlightenment. This historical class was of particular interest, as it explored the unique influence that Scottish lawyers had on the city of Montreal. Another course which I enjoyed greatly was International Trade Law, which was particularly interesting to study in Scotland at that time, as daily developments with Brexit negotiations made for an enriched curriculum.

#### ...and Cannon Calls

In addition to my studies, I spent endless afternoons discovering the city's treasures, my favorites of which included Arthur's Seat, the Scot Monument, and Mons Meg. I also made several trips out of Edinburgh to discover the Scottish countryside. In September, I rented a car and travelled up to the Isle of Skye; visiting distilleries and counting sheep as I drove through the picturesque highlands. Later in December, I rode the train to Inverness, and spent a weekend discovering the charming Scottish outpost. Both of these excursions allowed me to better appreciate the landscape and cities which have

shaped Scotland's rich history.

In a further attempt to immerse myself in local culture, I sought to read novels written exclusively by Scottish authors. I began with The Private Memoirs and Confessions of a Justified Sinner, by James Hogg, to whom I discovered I am distantly related. I also read Robert Louis Stevenson—who has always been a favorite of mine—and completed Kidnapped as well as Prince Otto. My reading list also featured a number of modern authors, including Irvine Welsh, Iain Banks, and Alisdair Gray. It was a particular pleasure to read novels so heavily inspired by the city of Edinburgh, and I was delighted to be able to retrace a protagonist's steps through the cobbled streets of the city.

#### A Well-Rounded Education

Spending a semester abroad is so much more than merely attending courses at a different university. My time in Edinburgh consisted of nothing less than four months of continuous education. Whether I was studying in class, reading atop Calton Hill, or admiring *The Monarch of the Glen*, each experience constituted an invaluable learning lesson.

Sir Walter Scott, himself an alumni of Edinburgh University, wrote that, "A lawyer without history or literature is a mechanic, a mere working mason; if he possesses some knowledge of these, he may venture to call himself an architect." While I still have much to learn before I can call myself an architect of the law, my time in Scotland has irreversibly deepened my historical understanding, and broadened my cultural horizons.


It will be an evening of ballroom dancing with the Directors Showband, and Scottish country dancing with the Black Watch Pipes and Drums.
