## In Honour and Praise of the St. Andrew's Society's First Lady Ball Chairman

As last year was the end of the Society's 180<sup>th</sup> year in existence, it is only right that we should honour our past presidents and other prominent officers of the Society throughout that period. Since this issue of the journal is mostly concerned with the latest Ball, it is most appropriate that we should honour the First Lady Chairman of the Ball, Millicent Hutchison, (familarly known as Milly Hutchison), widow of the late Dr. Keith Hutchison who was President of the Society between the years 1940-1945.

Milly Hutchison was born, Millicent Branch, the daughter of Dr. Edmund Branch, whose medical practice was on the island of St. Kitts in the West Indies. She moved to Montreal, and soon after her arrival, she met Dr. Keith Hutchison. They became engaged to marry. Being a member of the St. Andrew's Society of Montreal, he would have invited her to the St. Andrew's 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Ball. From then on she became very much interested in the balls.

After she married Dr. Hutchison, she held the position of the First Lady Ball Chairman. She was in charge of each ball until the last ball before the Second World War began. At that last ball, the majority of the young men were in their army uniforms. Because of "the presence of the many officers in the uniform of their regiments," the event later became known as the "Khaki Ball."

Although there had been a

Victory Ball at the cessation of hostilities in 1945, the Ball of 1946 was more spectacular, due no doubt to the remarkable efforts of the Ball Chairman, Mrs. Keith Hutchison, O.B.E., who proudly carried the flagstaff bearing the St. Andrew's flag along Peacock Alley and into the Ballroom of the Windsor Hotel where, to the sound of the regimental pipes of The Black Watch (Royal Highland) of Canada, eighty radiant debutantes were led into the Ballroom, amidst 2,000 guests, for their presentation to the distinguished Guests of

Honour, His Excellency, the Rt. Hon. Viscount Alexander of Tunis, Governor General of Canada, and her Excellency Viscountess Alexander. The magnificent ballroom at the Windsor Hotel was the perfect setting for the St. Andrew's Ball. After Dr. Hutchison's death, Milly continued her fine work as Ball Chairman with the assistance of her three sons, Alex, Bruce and Ian.

Milly Hutchison introduced the idea of having representation from Scotland's peerage to be invited as Guests of Honour to the St. Andrew's Ball. She also introduced the idea of having young


## Mount Royal Cemetery

### A prominent resting place for Montreal Scots

Today's members of the St. Andrew's Society of Montreal are fortunate to enjoy the legacies handed down by past leaders of the Montreal's Scottish community including the St. Andrew's Ball, a Montreal tradition for 180 years.

Another legacy can be found in the Mount Royal Cemetery where welfare committees of the Society have buried people of Scottish descent since 1857.

As the Society is no rarely called on to bury people, we are making some of the remaining space available to our members for the burial of their cremated remains. This is a unique opportunity for you to secure an excellent location in the Cemetery, with a unique connection to the Society and to Scotland. While it will not be possible



for you to place a personalized headstone, there is a shared headstone (pictured above) and the names and burial locations of any member would be noted in the records of the Cemetery and the Society.

A limited number of burial rights are being made available for \$500 per urn, over and above the Cemetery's regular charges (of roughly \$1,000). ### **Sermons, Addresses, Letters and Reports – The Presbyterian College Montreal 1865-2015**

On Saturday, 31<sup>st</sup> October, a special event took place in Presbyterian College. On that day a book launch was held for the book *Still Voices - Still Heard*, published as part of the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebrations of the College.

The book is a collection of sermons, addresses, letters and reports covering these 150 years. Of special interest to members of the Society is the chapter entitled *The College and Women in Ministry*, written by David Stewart Patterson, son of the Rev. Alison Stewart Patterson, LRAM, B.Th. DMin, STM, a member of The St. Andrew's Society, and a keen Scottish Country dancer.

Alison, born in Scotland, sister of Lord Bruce, came to Canada

after her marriage and settled in Montreal where she did wonderful work with young people particularly in creating choirs for them. As time went by Alison's interest in the church grew deeper, particularly within The Presbyterian Church in Canada in which she was eventually ordained as a minister.

When Alison accepted a call to ministry, females in this role were rare but Alison made her mark in many congregations within the Presbytery of Montreal and further afield, but particularly opening doors within the PCC.

Alison is still lovingly remembered by members in the many congregations in which she served.



Brian had a great love of literature and was passionate in the teaching of his cherished subject. He taught for more than 10 years in his homeland in the

UK and abroad and close to 30 years at Vanier College in Montreal. As President of the St. David's Society, he was very active within the Welsh Community and was a pillar of support in the activities of the Montreal Welsh Male Choir (Cor Meibion Cymraeg Montreal) where he sang tenor and worked feverishly to make sure it maintained its status as one of the most renowned and oldest choirs of the Province of Quebec. Brian was also an avid sportsman, and from the moment of arrival in Quebec in 1986, he associated himself with the Phys. Ed. Department of Vanier to help initiate young people into the pleasures of mountaineering, a pastime at which he excelled. Like all Welshmen, he had a lifetime love affair with the game of rugby. He joined the Old Boys at Montreal Irish RFC and also played with the Quebec Combined Rugby Team, bringing the English and French playing sides together in a



memorable esprit de corps. Later in life, he played cricket with the Pirates of the St. Lawrence Cricket Club. Surviving Brian is his beloved wife, Joanne Devlin, his parents, Jack and Edna Llewellyn, his sister, Nicky (John Ball), his nephew, James and his niece, Katy. At home in the UK are Kerensa Miller-Hart, Brian's goddaughter, with his great friends, David, Jenny, Pete, Carolyn, Kevin, Christine, Ron, John, Isabel and Jim. He will also be sorely missed by his brothers and sisters-in-law from the Devlin family, Denise (Claude Geneau), Michèle (Jean-Marc Duchesne), late Albert (Claudette Darveau), Jean- Yves (late Solange Veilleux), Jean-Eudes (late Denise Arseneault), André (Ghislaine Plamondon), Bertrand, Claude (Elaine Johnson), Jacques (Suzie Tremblay), Francine (Peter Foley), many nephews and nieces, and by so many personal friends, students and former students, and of course, his colleagues at Vanier.





*Celtic Lightening: How the Scots and the Irish Created a Canadian Nation* by Ken McGoogan (2015) – An engaging new book by the author of *How the Scots Invented Canada*.

*In Search of Your Scottish Ancestors* by Christine Woodcock (2015) – A handy reference guide by the leader of Genealogy Tours of Scotland, based in Brantford, Ontario.

*Surnames of Scotland: Their Origin, Meaning and History* by George F. Black with Mary Elder Black (2015) – This major reference work, first published in 1946, is a fully documented, alphabetical listing of over 8,000 Scottish family and personal names.

*Jellyfish* by Janice Galloway (2015) – The accomplished Scottish writer's new short-story collection was termed "exquisite" in a review in *The Guardian*.

*Truestory* by Catherine Simpson (2015) – A debut novel that's generating buzz. Summed up by the author herself as, "a wry tale of a mother

trapped with a child with Asperger's, who refuses to leave their isolated farmhouse."

The Atwater Library Scottish Collection now numbers over 1,700 titles – books, eBooks and DVDs. Each physical item contains a book plate acknowledging the contribution of the St. Andrew's Society of Montreal.

## Scottish Women Curlers Touring Canada – November 2015

The Canadian – Scottish Women's Curling Tour began in 1955. The tour operates on a five-year rotational basis. Canadian curlers visit Scotland followed five years later by Scottish curlers visiting Canada.

On November 6, 2015, twenty-four Scottish women curlers began a 3 week tour of Quebec, Ontario and Northern Ontario. The Scottish Women competed in friendly curling games against local curlers at 23 curling facilities during this three week tour. The group arrived in Montreal and travelled by coach to Quebec City to experience Canadian history. Then it's on to Montreal, Montebello, Ottawa, Russell, Gananoque, Kingston, Ajax and Toronto. Next a flight took them to Sudbury, with coach travel to Sault Ste Marie, the a flight back to Toronto, to the Niagara region, and finally ending with a game and Closing Banquet at the Mississauga Golf and Country Club on November 26.

List of Curling Facilities participating:

- 4 clubs in Montreal - Montreal West, Royal Montreal, Lachine and Pointe Claire.
- 3 clubs in Ottawa – Ottawa Curling, R.A. Centre and Ottawa Hunt.
- 4 clubs in Ontario - Russell, Gananoque, Royal Kingston and Annandale.
- 5 clubs in Toronto - Bayview, Cricket Club, Richmond Hill, Thornhill and Donalda.
- 5 clubs in Northern Ontario - Idylwyld, Espanola, Blind River, Soo Curlers and Tarentorus,
- 2 clubs in Mississauga - Dixie and Mississauga Golf.
- 1 club in Niagara region – St. Catharines Golf.

The Scottish Women's Tour is not as well-known as the Strathcona Cup (men's curling tour). The men tour the West, Central and Atlantic Canada in one tour. When the women visit Canada, they tour one region only, resulting in the Scottish Women's tour returning to each area of Canada every 30 years.

## History of Canadian and Scottish Women's Tours

The Canadian Women's Scottish Tour began in 1955. The tour now operates on a five-year rotational basis – Canadian curlers visit Scotland, followed five years later by Scottish curlers visiting Canada.

Scottish female curlers have three tours they can access - one to the US, Canada and Sweden and it is a prestigious honour to be selected as a tour participant. Canadian female curlers have an

opportunity to participate in two tours - the Women's Tour of Scotland and a Senior Women's Fellowship Tour to the US. While not as well known or sought after in Canada, any Canadian curler who has had the opportunity to join a curling tour will tell you it is a wonderful experience where friendships are made that last a lifetime.

During the 1971 Canadian Tour to Scotland, the Canadian Ladies Curling Association presented Scottish curlers with a beautiful silver bowl. The Canadian President at the time, Sylvia Fedoruk, asked that the award be named the President's Bowl. The Ladies Branch of the RCCC agreed and all Scottish Ladies Branch Presidents have their name engraved on it.

During the 2010 Canadian Tour to Scotland, a new trophy was presented on behalf of the 2005 Scottish Ladies Tour to Canada. The trophy is named in memory of their much-loved Courier, Muriel Fage from Nova Scotia, Canada, who passed away in 2008 after a long battle with cancer. It is now the Muriel Fage Trophy that is presented to the winner of the Canadian and Scottish Women's Tour.


