In Honour of the Society's First Lady Volunteer and also the First Lady President

As soon as the founding members had established the St. Andrew's Society of Montreal, their first concern was to acquire Scottish regalia from Scotland, planning ahead for their first St. Andrew's Day parade to be held on November 30, 1835. For some fortunate reason, they had decided to acquire the St. Andrew's flag in Montreal. Thanks to the Earl of Dalhousie's earlier kind offer to aid the Society in obtaining the regalia in Edinburgh, the Chains of Office for the President and Vice President had arrived safely from Edinburgh's most prestigious Hamilton and Inches Gold and Silversmith for the

Orders for parade. banners flags, and transparencies from Scotland had safely crossed the Atlantic Ocean and had arrived in New York, where they had to await custom clearance. Unfortunately, a fire occurred in the warehouse where they

were stored, and they were all badly damaged.

The first ladies committee, formed under the direction of Eliza McGill, had as their first task to make the required St. Andrew's flag for the parade on November 30. Eliza McGill, née Sarah Elizabeth Shuter Wilkins, was not only the wife of Peter McGill, the Society's first president, but also the ancestor of Montreal's well-known and amiable Robert Wilkins, President of the Empire Loyalist Society.

At the first meeting on the morning of November 30, 1835, two gentlemen, deputized by the ladies, many of whom were in attendance, presented the promised silken banner of St. Andrew to the Society on behalf of the ladies, in accordance with the Victorian etiquette at that time. The banner was described as "exquisite and costly alike in its material and workmanship" and was proudly carried in the first procession to St. Gabriel Street Church after the meeting. At the conclusion of the meeting, the members of the recently formed St. Andrew's Society of Montreal marched in procession to St. Gabriel Street Church, followed by the members of St. George's Society, St. Patrick's Society and the German Society. The procession marched to the tune of the Pipers. The bystanders, obviously of Scottish descent, lining the side of the street to St. Gabriel Street Church, were cheering enthusiastically and proudly waving their own Scottish flags. procession entered the church and listened to the sermon preached by Rev. Mr. Esson. After they departed from the Church, they again lined up in procession and marched back by another route in order that more bystanders could enjoy the procession. The procession ended at Rasco's Hotel, where the members of the St. Andrew's Society and all the other societies' enjoyed their first dinner together. At the time of their almost simultaneous inception, the four societies, St. Andrew's, St. George's, St. Patrick's and the German, entered into an arrangement whereby they would all participate in each other's Church Parade on their respective anniversary day. The Society, whose national day was being celebrated, would lead the parade.

Fortunately, by 1885, the Society's etiquette had changed and women's rights were finally accepted in Canada as they already were in Great Britain. I, myself, as historian of the Society, was able to personally hand over my own gift to the President of the Society who also was a lady, Mrs. Eileen Clark, a remarkable lady indeed. Eileen Clark was born Eileen Crawford in East Dunbartonshire, Scotland, in 1924. Her father was a Presbyterian minister. In 1945, she graduated from the University of St. Andrew's, Scotland, with her Science degree. The Second World War had already commenced, and she volunteered her services where she was soon

appointed as a Radar Technical Officer in the Radar Division. It was on this base that she met Ritchie Clark, her future husband, a very pleasant young man who had been transferred from the Canadian Air Force to the Royal Air Force.

After a short period, Eileen invited Ritchie Clark to meet her parents at their home in Dunbartonshire, and soon they were engaged to be married. After their marriage, Ritchie Clark, accompanied by his lovely Scottish wife, returned to his home in western Canada, where they settled and brought up their future family. Eventually, they moved to Montreal, where they lived in a fine home in the town of Mount Royal. At this time, she became a member of the St. Andrew's Society and was made Chairman of the Welfare Committee. There, she was very highly

respected in dealing with welfare recipients and was much appreciated by them because of her pleasant, caring and courteous manner.

Eileen was an active member of numerous cultural and women's associations, as well as many charitable organizations.

She was a voice for women in Canada and abroad. She was President of the Canadian Federation of University Women from 1979-1982. She was the 4th Vice President of the International Federation of University Women. She was also involved in the Montreal Council of Women. In 1983, she became the first woman to be president in the 153-year history of the St. Andrew's Society of Montreal. In recognition of her outstanding community service, she was awarded the Queen's Golden Jubilee Medal in 2002.

After settling in Canada, Eileen indicated that "Coming to Canada as a war bride, I am basically a homemaker, but have always done voluntary work. I am active in N.G.O.'s that focus on education and the status of women worldwide."

Braw Lads Gathering, 2016

This year I decided to make my annual visit to my home town of Galashiels to coincide with the Braw Lads Gathering which was started in 1930 by people from Galashiels to commemorate historical events that took place in our town.

Each of the Border towns has a Common Riding which dates back to the middle ages, and was a way of checking that the boundaries of the common land had not been moved.

The oldest one is held in Hawick, which celebrates the bringing home to Hawick in 1514 a flag taken from an English raiding party at the Battle of Hornshole in 1514.

The other towns that celebrate the riding of the marches are Langholm, Selkirk and Lauder. It is an opportunity for the residents to have a good time and is usually accompanied by sports and much drinking. In Hawick, for example, they celebrate by drinking rum and milk.

There is a great rivalry between the Border Towns and this is probably the main reason for Galashiels deciding to have the Braw Lads Gathering.

This year on the main ride out there were 334 riders following the principals, although unfortunately they did not ford the River Tweed this year as the river was high and running too fast to be safe to make the crossing. [From VisitScotland.com]

Return to the Ridings

Every summer the towns of the Scottish Borders stage the Common Ridings, one of the oldest equestrian festivals in the world. The ridings aren't just an unforgettable spectacle of horsemanship, pageantry and community spirit. They are a custom upheld with real fervour by locals in homage to the region's unique identity, shaped in part by its tumultuous past.

Deep Roots

The history of the Scottish Borders is deeply entwined with the turbulent era of the Border Reivers; the name given to the ruthless raiders and bandits who pillaged the lands on either side of the Anglo-Scots border from late 13th to early 17th century.

Today's residents commemorate the times when their forbearers patrolled the boundaries of their settlements on horseback, defending against these fearsome marauders at Return to the Ridings throughout the summer.

Proud Tradition

Today's colourful events take place in 11 of the region's towns, with Hawick, Selkirk, Langholm and Lauder laying claim to the oldest ridings. Each town has its own particular take on the tradition – some can last up to two weeks – but they usually involve lots of rideouts, barbecues, traditional sports, games, music and traditional tipples.

Did you Know?

Hawick is the oldest of the Common Ridings and celebrates the capture of an English flag from a would-be raiding party in 1514 by a youth of the town.

Galashiels Braw Lad's Gathering

At the crack of dawn on Saturday morning our young Principals gather for breakfast with the President of the Gathering and members of the Ceremonial



Committee before they arrive at the Burgh Chambers for the start of the Braw Lad's Day.

At 8:00 am the Braw Lad receives the Burgh Flag from the President of the Gathering and vows to return it "unsullied and untarnished" at 12 noon. The Braw Lad then leads the mounted cavalcade to Netherdale for the ceremony at the Raid Stone.

When they arrive, each Lass presents her Braw Lad with a sprig of sour plum from the surrounding trees. This is in commemoration of the affray in 1337, when a band of English soldiers were routed by the men of Gala when they were eating the sour plums. It is alleged that the river ran red with blood for three days and nights.

The Official cavalcade then ford the River Tweed at the Old Abbot's Ford, split from the cavalcade and proceed to Abbotsford House. In the meantime the Main Cavalcade has started to ride the burgh boundaries.

The Officials meet up with the main cavalcade and once again the Braw Lads his party across the River Tweed and onwards to the Auld Town for Cross for the Mixing of the Roses.

This ceremony commemorates the marriage of Margaret Tudor of England to King James the fourth of Scotland in 1503 when Margaret was given the Ettrick Forest as her dowry and as such the red and white roses are mixed by the Braw Lass in a moving ceremony at the Auld Town Cross to re-enact the act of Sasine.

Atwater Library hosting Scottish Diaspora Tapestry Nov 22 to Dec 10

The Atwater Library is excitedly preparing for a public display of the Scottish Diaspora Tapestry from November 22 to December 10. The St. Andrew's Society is sponsoring the exhibition with Bruce Bolton coordinating arrangements.

The Tapestry comprises 300 hand-stitched panels representing the stories of people of Scottish descent all over the world, including such far-flung and unlikely places as Antarctica and Russia.

The Official Party leave the platform and are replaced by officials of the Executive Council and the President of the Braw Lads' Gathering who meet the Laird of Gala and exchange a parchment making the election of the town to the Burgh of Barony Status in 1599.

The Official Party now proceed to the home of the Laird of Gala where the Braw Lad, Braw Lass and their Attendants are met and entertained by the Laird and his family. They then rejoin the main cavalcade and proceed up Scott Street heading towards the War Memorial, where only the Braw Lad remains mounted.

Still carrying the flag, at the stroke of twelve, the Braw Lad dips the Burgh Flag and a period of silence is observed to show respect to the fallen of the two World Wars.

The Official Party then return to the Burgh Chambers to receive the cheers of the mass crowds for a job well done and to return the Burgh Flag to the President of the Braw Lads' Gathering.

At 8pm there is a small dignified ceremony where the Braw Lass lays her mixed roses at the War Memorial after which they return to the Volunteer Hall where the Un-sashing Ceremony is held.

Sunday evening brings this year's Gathering to a close with a service at Gala Isle and usually starts the organisation for next year's Braw Lads' Gathering.


Flowers of the Forest
